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HOW TO

Choose a Fitness Facility

When you decide it's time to join the gym, or you're looking for a new fitness option, there are a lot of options to consider. All-inclusive clubs, specialty training gyms and aerobics-only facilities all make up today's fitness club landscape, which has grown by leaps and bounds over the past 20 years.

Depending on what you're looking for, there can be quite a difference in price. A membership at the national chain won't cost as much as one at the locally owned club, but you probably won't get all the perks, either. Just like everywhere else, you have to pay to play.

Here are some things to consider when weighing your fitness club options:

MACHINES AND EQUIPMENT

Not all gyms have the same equipment. Some may have more elliptical trainers or treadmills but lack free weights or universal weight machines. The culture of a gym often has an effect on the fitness equipment that's offered. The clientele may be more geared toward aerobics and cardio training, rather than weightlifting. Be sure to do a walk-through first to determine if the gym you're considering has the equipment you are most going to need.

COST AND CONTRACT

A gym's joining fee, monthly membership fees and length of contract may be a major factor in your decision, so pay attention to what you're paying for. Some gyms offer

special discounts at the time you join, but then raise their rates after only a few months. Others offer incredibly low monthly rates, but their contracts are inflexible. It is common for gyms to require a 12-month contract, which ends up going to waste when the user doesn't visit the gym very often. Read the pricing and contract details thoroughly.

ACCESS AND LOCATION

One of the most important things you will need to consider is the accessibility of your fitness facility. Many gyms now offer access 24 hours a day, seven days a week by using a dedicated key or code. Determine whether a gym offering anytime access would work best with your schedule. Also consider the location of the gym in proximity to your house. If it is on your way to work or on the way home, that could motivate you to stop by more often.

RULES AND TIME OF DAY

While a Saturday afternoon may seem like the perfect time to go down to a gym and sign up, it may not give you the best look at your prospective gym's culture. Schedule a visit when you are most likely to work out so you will know how busy it is during that time of day. A membership isn't worth much if you can't actually use the equipment. Also, be sure to check on the gym's rules. Some gyms have rules about grunting or dropping weights during a workout, and those gyms are generally more geared toward cardiovascular training.

HOW TO

Choose a Qualified CPA

When you're searching for a Certified Public Accountant, whether for your small business or your personal finances, you'll want to find a professional whose expertise is best suited to your specific situation. All CPAs must meet state licensing requirements and hold a bachelor's degree in accounting, as well as meet experience requirements and a Uniform CPA Examination certification.

EXPERIENCE

FEES AND COST

Like with every professional service, cost should be taken into account when choosing a CPA. After all, by choosing an accountant, you're making an investment in your business' well-being. Ask if the firm or individual bills by the hour or at a fixed service charge. This

can help you find the option that fits within your budget and can offer you the best value.

REFERENCES

Finding the best CPA may require some research and interviews. Much like a job interview, you'll want to inquire about your prospective candidate's training, qualifications and professional references. Most likely, a CPA can provide you with reviews or references from previous clients, ideally from companies that compare to your business. Check online reviews or the Better Business Bureau for additional references.

SERVICES OFFERED

Ask yourself what you need the accountant to do for you, and be sure the CPA you're considering can provide you with the services you need. Most accountants will offer bookkeeping, tax preparation and financial planning services, so be sure to ask if an accounting firm can handle all of your business needs before you decide to do business with them.

COMPATIBILITY

Having a good working relationship with your CPA is crucial. Typically, deciding to work with an accountant means establishing a long-term relationship. This is a person or office who will have access to your business' finances and other confidential details. Be sure you find someone you can trust and someone who communicates effectively. Being able to get along well with your CPA will go a long way. Find out how accessible the accountant will be, and be sure you will be able to reach him or her in an emergency.

HOW TO

Choose a Solar Power System

ASSESS YOUR SOLAR POTENTIAL

Before deciding to switch to solar electricity at home, assess the potential solar energy that can be produced at your location. Because PV (photovoltaic) technologies use both direct and scattered sunlight to create electricity, the solar resource across the United States is usually ample for home solar electric systems. That's especially true in the Yakima Valley.

However, the amount of power generated by a solar energy system at a particular site depends on how much of the sun's energy reaches it, and the size of the system itself.

Several mapping services and tools are available to help you determine your home's solar energy potential. Some of the services also offer information on the estimated system size, potential costs and savings, and local contractors.

CONSIDER THE FOLLOWING

Nearby shade trees. Contractors will also help evaluate shading, but also consider your own or your neighbor's trees that are still growing and could shade your system in the future.

The age of your roof and how long until it will need to be replaced. If you expect to need a new roof within the next few years, you may want to consider making that improvement before installing solar.

Neighborhood or homeowner association (HOA) restrictions or approval requirements. Some states now have "solar rights provisions" limiting the ability of HOAs to restrict solar installations or limit solar access.

These provisions vary state to state, and by municipality; check into your own HOA covenants and state laws.

ASSESS YOUR OPTIONS FOR USING SOLAR

Purchasing and installing a system that you fully own and maintain is no longer the only option if you want to go solar. Even if you rent your home or don't want to purchase a rooftop system, there are many programs that will enable you to still benefit from solar electricity.

However, purchasing a solar energy system with cash or a loan is the best option when you want to maximize the financial benefits of installing solar panels, take advantage of tax credits and increase the market value of your home.

The solar installer will connect the system to the grid, and receive an interconnection permit from the utility. When the PV system generates more power than the homeowner requires, the customer is often able to sell excess electricity to the grid. And when the homeowner's electricity needs exceeds the capacity of the system, the home draws energy from the grid as usual.

ASK AROUND

Almost any neighborhood has homes that have installed some form of solar energy system. Talk to your neighbors or family members who have recently gone solar for references. And when researching installers, be sure to find qualified and insured professionals with the proper certification. You are usually better off using a local company.

TIPS FOR SELECTING TREATMENT

Professionals in the addiction treatment field offer advice on what to consider when choosing a treatment program. Overall, gather as much information as you can about the program or provider before making a decision on treatment. If you know someone who has first-hand knowledge of the program, it may help to ask about his or her personal experience. It is often best to work with a local treatment provider.

QUESTIONS

Here are some questions you can ask that may help guide your choice:

What kind of treatment does the program or provider offer? It is important to gauge whether the facility provides all the currently available methods or relies on one approach. You may want to learn if the program or provider offers medication and if mental health issues are addressed together with addiction treatment.

Is treatment tailored to the individual? Matching the right therapy to the individual benefits everyone. It may also be helpful to determine whether treatment will be adapted to meet changing needs as they arise.

What is expected of the patient? You will want to understand what will be asked of you in order to decide what treatment best suits your needs.

Is treatment success measured? By assessing whether and how the program or provider measures success, you may be able to better compare your options.

How does the program or provider handle relapse? Relapse is common, and you will want to know how it is addressed.

There are different kinds of addiction specialists who will be involved in your care, including doctors, nurses, therapists, social workers and others. In some treatment programs, different specialists work as a team to help you recover from your addiction.

WILL I NEED MEDICATION?

Some people do, and that is a good question to ask your treatment provider. Medications are currently available to treat addictions to alcohol, nicotine and opioids (heroin and prescription pain relievers), and your treatment team might recommend one of those medicines.

There are also medicines to treat mental health conditions (such as depression) that might be contributing to the addiction. In addition, medication is sometimes prescribed to help with the symptoms associated with drug withdrawal. When medication is available, it can be combined with behavioral therapy to ensure success for most patients.

ADDITIONAL CONSIDERATIONS

- Treatment Setting? Inpatient or outpatient?
- Cost may be a factor when selecting a treatment approach.
- Your participation can make a big difference.
- Remember that changing deep habits is hard, takes time and requires repeated efforts.
- There are many roads to getting better. What is important is finding yours.
- Understanding the available treatment options — from behavioral therapies and medications to mutual-support groups — is the first step. The important thing is to remain engaged in whatever method you choose.

Ultimately, receiving treatment can improve your chances of success.



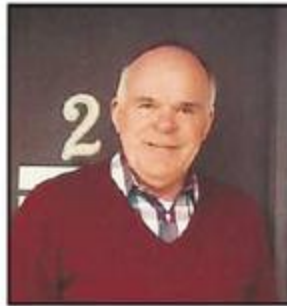
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HOW TO

Choose an Electrician

At some point, homeowners, business owners and general contractors all need a quality electrician. And while there are a number of great options to choose from in our area, there are a few key points you'll want to keep in mind when choosing the best man or woman for the job.

LICENSED AND INSURED

One of the most important things to consider is if your electrician is licensed, insured and bonded before they come out to a job. This will protect you from any unnecessary costs, should something go wrong in the process, and will ensure the electrician has the proper training to perform safe and effective work.

A license is your guarantee that the contractor you're hiring has done the necessary courses and practical work in order to complete a job correctly and safely. Always be sure to check if the license is current and that it covers the type of work you need completed.

A GOOD VALUE

The cheapest deal may not be the best deal in this situation. Check with three or four electricians to get full, itemized quotes for the job you'd like to have done. Check on whether there's a call-out charge, and if materials are included in the quote. Be sure to also consider that price isn't necessarily the only factor in this scenario. Spend time finding an electrician or electrical company that guarantees their

work and will correct any work that may not meet standards.

INDUSTRY EXPERIENCE

One size fits all does not apply when it comes to electricians. Some may have additional qualifications or special training in a certain area of electrical work, while some may even have specific accreditations. Look at how long an electrician has been in the business, and possibly discuss any previous projects.

RECOMMENDATIONS

Chances are, you may have a friend or relative who has worked with an electrician in the past who can provide a good name. If not, turn to the internet to look at local business directories or online reviews to get an idea of their work. Some electricians may also be able to provide references from previous satisfied customers. A good reputation often has a direct correlation to the quality of work you can expect.

COMMUNICATION

Completing a project that involves electrical work can be stressful, and nobody wants to work with a tradesman who displays a bad attitude or who doesn't communicate effectively. Take note of the person's professionalism and timeliness in making a decision. You don't want to end up with any unexpected issues due to miscommunication.

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HOW TO

Choose Between Cannabis vs. Hemp CBDs

There's an all-natural, alternative method of treating anxiety, insomnia and chronic pain, but not everyone has been introduced to the many health benefits associated with cannabidiol, or CBD.

Only in the past few years has the general public become aware of the benefits associated with using CBD products such as oils, edibles and tinctures. These products — derived from the cannabis and hemp plants — can be found in grocery stores, wellness clinics and cannabis shops all around the Yakima Valley and the state.

As the stigma around cannabis and hemp gradually disappears, people from all walks of life are now using CBD products to alleviate a wide range of mental and physical ailments. These products can also be used to limit anxiety in animals.

But before you rush out and stock up on CBD products, it's important to understand what you're getting yourself into.

WHAT IS CBD?

CBD is one of many compounds known as cannabinoids that are found in cannabis and hemp plants. These compounds interact with our bodies by binding to receptors in our endocannabinoid system in unique ways. When determining whether hemp or cannabis CBD is best for you, it is important to understand the differences between its two primary forms.

WHAT'S THE DIFFERENCE?

While the hemp and cannabis plants are similar, their CBDs have one major distinguishing characteristic: Cannabis CBDs contain tetrahydrocannabinol, or THC — the cannabinoid known for its psychoactive effects — and hemp CBDs do not.

The cannabis (aka marijuana) plant has short, fat leaves and is grown for its flowering buds that contain THC. By contrast, the hemp plant grows tall, with narrow leaves. Unlike cannabis, hemp naturally contains very little THC yet contains high levels of CBD.

CANNABIS CBD BENEFITS. DRAWBACKS

When cannabis is ingested or smoked, THC attaches to cannabinoid receptors and creates a high, which may include feelings of euphoria, elation and relaxation. There are many proven medical benefits to THC found in medical marijuana cannabis, including chronic pain relief, glaucoma treatment, muscle relaxation, nausea control and PTSD treatment. It has also been found to kill cancer cells and may help treat HIV. If sourcing CBD from marijuana cannabis, choose a strain with high CBD and low THC levels.

HEMP CBD BENEFITS. DRAWBACKS

Hemp CBD, meanwhile, offers similar benefits but without any potential mind-altering effects. Hemp CBD is highly concentrated and does not contain more than 0.3 percent THC, essentially a trace amount that has no psychoactive effects and limited side effects. CBD research has shown a wide array of benefits from CBD use, such as treatment of anxiety and depression, different types of pain and inflammation, seizures, cancer and other conditions, both chronic and acute.

Because hemp CBD offers so many benefits without resulting in an altered psychological state, it can be used every day with no adverse physical effects.

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HOW TO

Choose an Asphalt Contractor

When choosing a contractor to oversee an asphalt paving project, it's important to remember that the company with the lowest bid is not always the best option — especially if a lack of accreditation, insufficient crew or other issue is the reason the price is so low.

As you weigh your options for hiring an asphalt contractor, you'll want to consider a few important details about the companies you're looking to hire.

INSURANCE AND WARRANTY

If a bid seems unusually low, this could mean the contractor is uninsured. In the event of an accident, a homeowner with an uninsured or underinsured contractor may end up paying the price.

To protect yourself and the crew working on your project, ensure the contractor's insurance covers auto liability, general liability, an umbrella policy and worker's compensation. Everyone on the crew should be covered by the insurance policy and the contractor should have a minimum \$500,000 per policy coverage, with \$1 million to \$2 million being an ideal amount.

It's also important to ask for a project warranty in writing before the work gets started so you can guarantee the work is completed to industry standards. You should also ask for tips from installation experts about how to extend the life of the completed paving project.

MATERIALS, EQUIPMENT AND CREW

- Having good materials, the latest equipment

and a sufficiently sized and trained crew goes a long way toward ensuring a successful project. Asphalt is continuously recycled, meaning different grades of asphalt contain various percentages of recycled material. High-grade asphalt is ideal, as it contains less recycled material, while low-grade asphalt can affect the look of and shorten the lifespan of your pavement.

- Ask about the contractor's equipment and how it is maintained. If the equipment is older, worn out or hasn't been properly maintained, the

machines may break down and delay the project. Any significant wait time can adversely affect the finished product.

- Avoid contractors who do asphalt paving by hand, as paving machines are more efficient and deliver a better-quality product. An efficient paving team should have five to eight trained, credentialed and experienced workers.

EXPERIENCE, SCOPE AND REPUTATION

Contractors should have the right amount of specific experience. If you're doing industrial paving, a contractor whose expertise lies in small, residential paving projects may not be right for your project.

That being said, make sure the contractor has a clearly written scope of work for your project. Research the contractor thoroughly and ask local business owners or neighbors about their asphalt contractor experiences.

You should also ask the contractor for at least three references so you can ask detailed questions about the work the company does. Look for online ratings and reviews on the company's website, social media and with the Better Business Bureau.

It's important to remember that the company with the lowest bid is not always the best option.

BEGIN LOOKING

You can start looking for a drug or alcohol treatment program by speaking with a doctor, doing research on the help that is available and discussing the options with your friend or loved one. Things to consider include the reputation of the facility and the type of care you are seeking.

There are often advantages to choosing a treatment facility near your home.

If you or your medical specialist decides you can benefit from treatment, you have many options. Various online websites allow you to search geographically and also give you information about each facility. If you prefer to speak with someone, you can call the Department

of Health and Human Services helpline and get some advice on how to proceed: 1-800-662-HELP (4357).

Treatment approaches must be tailored to address each patient's drug use pattern and also their drug-related medical, psychiatric and social problems. Some treatment centers offer outpatient treatment programs, which allows you to continue to perform some of your daily responsibilities while receiving help. Other people do better in inpatient (residential) treatment. An addiction specialist can advise you about your best options.

WHAT KIND OF COUNSELING SHOULD I GET?

Behavioral treatment (also known as "talk therapy") helps patients engage in the process, change their attitudes and behaviors related to drug use and increase healthy life skills. These treatments can enhance the effectiveness of medications and help people remain in treatment. Treatment for drug use and addiction can be delivered in many different settings using a variety of behavioral approaches.

HOW WILL I FIND TREATMENT THAT IS AFFORDABLE?

The federal government's Behavioral Health Treatment Services Locator provides payment information for each of the services listed, including information on sliding fee scales and payment assistance. You should select the "substance use facilities" section and enter a ZIP code. You can also go to the "Frequently Asked Questions" section for more information. Many states offer payment assistance for substance use treatment.

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HOW TO

Keep Your Car Healthy Year-Round

No one likes spending money at the auto mechanic, but everyone with a car or truck eventually ends up going there at some point or another. At least you can limit your visits to the shop by performing some basic maintenance tasks throughout the year.

Many of these things can be done in your driveway if you have enough knowledge and time. Whether you do your own maintenance work or take your car to the mechanic, you should always keep car maintenance top of mind so your ride runs smoothly and safely year round.

REGULARLY CHECK FLUIDS

Checking your fluids is a relatively simple task that is vitally important to maintaining a healthy vehicle. Some of the most important fluids to regularly check are:

- **Oil:** All cars differ a bit on how often they need their oil changed but for most it is around every 5,000 miles. Healthy oil will be a honey-brown color, while oil needing to be changed will be a blackish color.

- **Windshield wiper fluid:** You may use it more often during the winter, so you'll want to check it every few weeks or so. If you are using it less in the summer, you should be able to get away with checking it every month and a half or so.

- **Coolant:** It's usually good to check your coolant levels every 30,000 miles. This liquid is especially important because it keeps your car cool and ensures it doesn't overheat.

CHECK FILTERS, SPARK PLUGS, BATTERY

Keeping your engine clean will keep it running smoothly, so it's important to regularly change the oil, air and fuel filters. Other areas to focus on under the hood are the PCV valve, spark plugs and spark plug wires.

Batteries may be the most important accessory to check on a regular basis. Maintenance tasks include keeping the battery clean and secured so it doesn't vibrate, keeping connections clean and tight at the terminals, and checking the water level (if necessary).

MAINTAIN BRAKES AND TRANSMISSION

Many of today's cars have disc brakes in the front and drum brakes in back. When brakes need a mechanic's attention, they give off certain warning signals. While some brake noises are normal, chirps, continuous squeals and grinding sounds almost always mean that it's time for new brake pads or shoes.

Meanwhile, a regular checkup of the transmission fluid will keep your car shifting smoothly.

ROTATE, BALANCE, ALIGN TIRES

Every car is different, but a rule of thumb is to rotate and balance your car's tires after every other oil change (10,000 miles or so). This helps your tires wear out at a more even rate and will hopefully give them a longer lifespan. You can check your tire alignment less frequently, typically once a year, or if you notice your car veering when you're driving.

HOW TO

Choose a Health Insurance Plan

If your workplace doesn't provide health insurance, or you're wanting to look at alternative plans, there are some important things to consider. Finding the right health insurance plan can be incredibly complicated if you're not entirely sure what you're looking for. It's important to do your research so you can find the best solution to fit your needs.

LOCATION

Do you already have a favorite doctor or medical team in your area? Some insurance plans do not offer coverage in all areas, eliminating some provider names from consideration. Look through the plans and check whether you can continue to see the same doctor or other local doctors on your list. Also check to see how far the closest provider is within your coverage area, as some health insurance plans only offer service providers in cities that are hours away.

PRESCRIPTIONS COSTS

If you have existing prescriptions, be sure to take their cost into account. Many health care plans divide prescriptions into cost tiers, so switching to a new plan could change what you pay at the pharmacy. Think about the prescriptions you currently take, and may continue to take long-term, and assess how that may affect your budget.

OVERALL HEALTH

Any number of factors can affect how often you go to the doctor. Are you generally in good health and only go to the doctor for routine checkups? Do you have a chronic illness that needs consistent appointments or treatments? Though it's not always foreseeable, the number of times you may need to see a provider throughout the year may play a role in choosing the best plan.

PLANNING AHEAD

Do you have a surgery planned in the near future? If you already know it may be a few years down the road, you will want to take that into consideration. Do you plan on having children? Be sure to look at what maternity services are covered in your plan options.

PREMIUMS

Of course, one of the major concerns when choosing the plan that's right for you and your family is cost. How much will you be paying in premiums each month? How often you expect to go to the doctor may influence this assessment. Typically, more coverage will mean a higher monthly premium, but with that higher coverage generally you'll have less out-of-pocket expense during a visit.

A lower premium may mean a higher out-of-pocket cost during the visit. Be sure to carefully review deductible, co-pay and premium numbers when making a decision.

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HOW TO

Choose the Best Cabinetry

Whether you're designing a custom home, remodeling an existing home, or doing a full overhaul of a fixer-upper, cabinetry will come into play at some point in the process. And while the sky's the limit on cabinet design, there are a few key points to consider when making your selection.

CONSIDER BUDGET

Come up with a number you're willing to work with. Research the cost for projects similar to the room you're working on. You want to make sure you're getting a good price, quality, and ultimately, value.

CONSIDER MATERIAL AND COLOR

When choosing your material, you'll want to consider grain, color and characteristics. First, you should look at how dent-resistant a material is, especially for kitchen cabinets. Looking at the most durable of materials will likely provide the best value. Consider wood grain if you choose a wood cabinet and think about how the overall finished product will look in your home. When choosing color, decide on a color that fits well with the rest of your décor and the rest of the room. Your choice of cabinets can help you make a bold statement in your home.

MAXIMIZE SPACE

Determine the best way to make use of your room's space when choosing cabinetry. Especially if you're remodeling a room, there may be ways to fit more cabinets into the existing space, which will create more storage space. Consider whether you prefer more drawers or doored cabinets and work with your designer to come up with a workable number for each.

Think about what purpose each cabinet will serve, whether it's an oversized drawer for baking sheets or pots and pans or a cabinet for trash and recycling.

ORGANIZATIONAL FEATURES

Consider possible additions to your cabinetry such as built-in dividers, drawers within lower cabinets, a spice rack or a Lazy Susan. Additions tucked inside cabinetry can provide attractive ways to introduce more storage. Think about what purpose each cabinet will serve, whether it's an oversized drawer for baking sheets or pots and pans or a cabinet for trash and recycling.

HARDWARE

Once a final decision has been made on cabinet design, installation and hardware will be your next consideration. 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HOW TO

Keep Your Lawn Healthy

Spring is the time to think about some preventive maintenance for your lawn. And while winter hasn't given up yet, that time is upon us. Consider these recommendations from industry experts.

AERATION IS CRUCIAL

As you prepare your lawn for spring and summer, there's a non-chemical tactic you can employ that will pay significant dividends later on: Core aeration. Performing the core aeration process at least once a year will provide oxygen to the roots to maximize growth.

Not only does aeration dramatically improve the growing environment for grass; it also creates a valuable top dressing on the turf when it is mowed. The cores that are pulled up and dropped on the lawn simulate a microbial environment, and aeration helps improve the growing conditions for your lawn. Spring is the best time to aerate, but many people do it in the fall.

MAINTAIN YOUR MOWER

Sharpening your lawn mower blades is also essential to creating the best grass-growing conditions. Worn-out blades shred the tips of the grass blades and opens them up to disease pathogens that can cause browning. Sharpened blades, on the other hand, will give you a nice, sharp cut.

And don't forget to clean out the mower deck. If a lawnmower is caked full of grass, it restricts airflow and doesn't allow the machine to work

the way it is designed. Some experts recommend using a mulching mower instead of one that requires you to pick up the grass by hand.

PROPER WATERING TECHNIQUES

Having your equipment in good working order is required, but it's also crucial to tend to your irrigation water system. In preparation for the watering season, be sure all of your irrigation water faucets are turned off. Also remember to adjust your sprinkler heads and tweak the nozzles to ensure even water distribution.

It's also important to note the downsides of overwatering. After all, it's much easier to improve a dry landscape than it is to recover from an overwatered one.

OTHER THINGS TO CONSIDER

- A healthy lawn needs good soil. Most turf grasses prefer neutral soils, so to be sure that your efforts aren't in vain, always perform a soil test first. The results will tell you what to add to the soil to make it ideal for the grass you plan to grow. These tests indicate which elements are missing from your soil and how much to add to remedy the problem.

- Don't apply a weed preventer (liquid or granular) or use weed and feed fertilizer when planning to sow grass. You can control weeds only after you have mowed new grass seedlings at least four times. Any weed controls applied when you sow seed will prevent germination and may kill immature seedlings.

HOW TO

Choose a Real Estate Agent

Whether you're looking to buy a home or sell a commercial property, selecting a reputable real estate agent to walk you through the process should be a priority. No one knows the local real estate market better than the professionals, so there's no reason to go it alone.

At the same time, it's important to be thorough in your search because not all agents are created equally. As in every profession, real estate agents have certain strengths and weaknesses. Read on so you can sift through the long list of qualified professionals in the area.

KNOW YOUR OPTIONS

People who help others buy and sell properties are often interchangeably called real estate agents, real estate brokers and Realtors. However, each term carries with it different criteria.

- To become a real estate agent, you must take some basic training classes and pass a state licensing exam. Agents must be affiliated with a licensed real estate broker and take continuing education classes to renew their licenses.

- In addition to the requirements real estate agents have, real estate brokers must take more classes to qualify for the broker's license exam. Brokers who pass the test can sell real estate without being affiliated with another company.

- Brokers and agents can represent buyers and sellers, but cannot call themselves a Realtor unless they are active members of the National Association of Realtors.

DO YOUR RESEARCH

Ask people you trust about their experiences buying and selling real estate and see if they have any recommendations for a real estate agent. Once you have an agent or broker in mind, talk to their recent clients and ask them for a list of referenced.

Look at their current listings to see what type of properties they work with. Check for licensing, credentials and potential disciplinary actions in their past. It's also important to consider the average number of clients, ratio of buyers to sellers and the areas they cover.

CONDUCT INTERVIEWS

One of the best ways to determine if you're compatible with an agent is to interview the individual as an employer would interview a prospective employee. Trust, chemistry and honesty between a Realtor and buyer/seller is essential to forming a strong working relationship.

Ask the following questions to help you get the best results:

- What is your professional background? Ask about their experience, any professional awards, how they got into this line of work and what they enjoy about their job.

- What kind of support do you have? Depending on the number of clients and properties the person is managing, the amount of teamwork or support staff involved in their position could tell you if they're prepared to take on another obligation.

- Why are you the best equipped to handle my situation? If you're buying or selling a specific type of property, this question can tell you what the agent knows about working with that particular kind of property.

HOW TO

KNOW THE PROS AND CONS

WHEN TO BUY

HOW TO

Choose an Insurance Agency

Selecting an insurance agency may seem daunting, but the process is quite similar to choosing any other service provider. Shopping around for insurance, instead of simply picking a name from a Google search, will help you determine what your specific needs are. Weighing your options will also help you understand and evaluate what you're getting into based on certain criteria.

Following these steps may make the process a little easier:

DETERMINE YOUR INSURANCE NEEDS

The first step is to decide which kind of insurance you need. Because the scope of coverage varies by agency, it's important to figure out what your personal or business insurance needs entail. Some agencies may offer personal insurance, but not commercial insurance.

UNDERSTAND YOUR OPTIONS

Insurance companies can provide coverage through direct writers, independent agents or insurance brokers. Some insurance agencies allow you to buy insurance directly without having to go through an agent. This option can be cheaper because insurance agents require companies to pay them a commission for their services.

These are the most common options for buying insurance:

- **Direct writers** are insurance companies where the salespeople work exclusively for that company.
- **Independent agents** work for the insured and may have contracts with multiple insurance companies, allowing them to offer more options.
- **Insurance brokers** represent companies in complicated insurance matters to find the best coverage at the lowest cost and may charge a fee for their services.

FINDING THE RIGHT AGENCY/AGENT

There are a number of ways to find the agency or agent that is best suited to handle your individual needs. Asking family, friends or colleagues for a referral; searching the internet; and consulting trade associations or other business owners are three good places to start.

Before you make your final decision, you'll want to evaluate the candidates based on the following criteria:

- **Technical knowledge** — Ask the agent/agency about their years of experience, reach, areas of expertise, education, and the names of the companies they represent.
- **Personality** — Insurance agents are paid commissions by the insurance company, so their honesty and trustworthiness are important.
- **References** — Ask for client references and follow up with them with any questions you may have.
- **Digital presence** — Search the agent/agency's name online and look for news articles, online reviews, websites, client testimonials and social media pages.
- **Quote** — Asking for a quote is one way to determine if the agency or agent can meet your needs and expectations. You can evaluate them by how fast they can get a quote, how well they explain what the coverage entails and how detailed they are in explaining the price.
- **Credentials** — Agents may have letters behind their names, which indicate their credentials. Ask what they mean and how they got that designation.
- **Licensing** — Check that the agent and/or company is licensed in your state.
- **Complaints** — Talk to the Better Business Bureau to determine if any complaints have been filed against the agent you're considering.

HOW TO

Acquire a Concealed Pistol's License

Learning the laws regulating the use of firearms is a must for responsible gun ownership. Local regulations differ and laws vary from state to state. In Washington, citizens who carry a concealed pistol or who want to keep a loaded weapon in their vehicles are required to obtain a concealed pistol license (CPL) from their local law enforcement agency. Due to the detailed nature involved in conducting background checks, processing times can take up to 30 days.

WHERE DO I APPLY?

If you reside in an unincorporated part of Yakima County, you can apply for a CPL at the Yakima County Sheriff's office. If you are a city resident, you can usually apply at your local police department, including Yakima, Sunnyside and Selah. Check their websites or give them a call to find out.

WHAT DO I NEED?

For an original CPL, you will be asked to schedule a fingerprint appointment. Some jurisdictions limit the days and times fingerprinting is available. If you need a CPL renewal, you may not apply until 90 days prior to the expiration date shown on your current CPL.

If you are a Yakima County or out-of-state resident and your Washington state CPL is lost, stolen or destroyed, you may apply for a replacement from the Yakima County Sheriff's office regardless of where the permit was issued.

PRICING

It costs \$49.25 to get your original concealed pistol license through the Yakima County Sheriff's Office or City of Yakima Police Department and \$32 to renew it. Late renewals cost \$42 and replacement cards are \$10.

BACKGROUND CHECKS

All successful CPL applicants must pass a background check and submit their fingerprints for identity verification. Some local cities have different finger-printing rules, so check out their websites or give them a call to find out what you need to do. At the Yakima County Sheriff's Office, appointments for fingerprinting are generally available Monday through Friday, excluding legal holidays.

CPL REQUIREMENTS

In order to receive a carry permit, you must be 21 years of age or older; be a citizen of the U.S. or a permanent resident alien; live in Yakima County (or outside of Washington state, in the case of non-resident applicants); and have a current driver's license or state ID (passports or military IDs are not accepted). If you have out-of-state IDs, you may have a 60-day wait for an original application.

For the full list of current laws and rules regarding firearms, visit the Washington State Dept. of Licensing website or the Washington State Legislature website.

Also, consider taking a firearms safety class if you haven't already. It is not a requirement in Washington state, but it's a good idea.

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HOW TO

Choose a Broadband Internet Provider

When you're choosing an internet service provider (ISP), you want one that gives you fast speeds and fair pricing. You also want to know if the ISP has a good reputation for customer service, and it always helps if the provider offers extra perks like no-cost installation, no-contract options and unlimited data. Depending on where you live, you may have to choose between several different providers operating in your area. Here are some ways to navigate the process of deciding which ISP is best for your needs.

SEE WHAT'S AVAILABLE

The first step in choosing an internet provider is figuring out what's available in your area. Not every provider is available in every area, so a quick search online will give you a more accurate snapshot of which internet types are available, which speeds you can get, and at what prices.

LOCALLY OWNED?

In some parts of the country, there are one or more locally owned internet service providers. These ISPs offer customers a closer connection to the company and, often times, the ability to deal directly with the owner. If that appeals to you and if you want to keep your money local, check out the "home town" providers in your area.

COMPARE FEATURES AND COSTS

You'll want an internet plan that offers adequate speeds, dependable service, and a large enough data limit for the month — all at a price you can afford.

All internet providers have their own specialties, and it helps to pick one that coincides with what you need the most. Here are the biggest issues to consider: Plans and pricing, speeds, installation and equipment costs, customer satisfaction ratings and data caps and overage fees

Some providers deliver ultra-fast speeds, while others have more straightforward plans that are easier on the wallet. Many providers impose data caps that limit how much internet you can use per month — though some of them offer unlimited data.

You can also sometimes find plans that have no annual contract requirements. This allows you to quit anytime without having to pay early termination fees (ETFs). LOOK FOR PROMOTIONS

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HOW TO

Select an Estate Planning Attorney

When choosing an attorney to represent you during the estate-planning process, there are certain questions you will need to ask that will help you find the best legal partner. If you are going to vet out an attorney online, use sites that are third-party verified. This means that they are not paid to list the attorney and the attorney is ranked based on certain criteria.

ESTATE PLANNING EXPERTISE

There are many attorneys who say that they do estate planning, and many of them do. However, the real question to ask is, "Do you

practice exclusively in this area of the law?" Just as there are doctors who specialize in certain areas of medicine, there are attorneys who are generalists and those who limit their practices to a specific area of law, such as estate planning. The ones who are specially trained are more likely to correctly identify areas that could be problems for you down the road if the proper planning is not done.

MALPRACTICE INSURANCE?

If the attorney holds a legal malpractice insurance policy, this is a sign of accountability. Anyone can make a mistake and you should not make the mistake of hiring an attorney who does not have malpractice insurance. Remember, in many states, an attorney is not required to carry malpractice insurance. Don't get burned.

ASK ABOUT LAW SCHOOL ASSOCIATIONS

Law schools that are harder to get into typically have higher standards and only accept the best applicants, so it's important to research your attorney's education background. For reference, there are four tiers in the law school ranking system, with the first tier being the hardest to get into.

rating, which refers to the tire's maximum speed in relation to the load index.

Consider when and where you'll be using these tires most. Are you looking for something all-season? Are you looking for winter/snow tires? Select something that will fit your specific needs. Think about the worst driving conditions you may expect to encounter and factor that into your decision. If you typically just drive around your neighborhood or to the grocery store, you don't need the same tires as a long-distance commuter.

PRICING

A new set of tires can cost a chunk of change, so you want to be sure you're getting the best value. Evaluate how much per mile each tire may cost, especially if you're trying to make a decision between tires that fit for your specific needs and a set that may be slightly cheaper.
